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Goats at Fairweather Nature Preserve

The City of Medina has recently contracted Healing Hooves to help mitigate the invasive species growing in Fairweather Nature Preserve. Goats are naturally agile animals who can easily navigate steep slopes and uneven terrain. They enjoy eating plants that typically irritate humans, such as poison ivy, poison oak and English ivy. This method also results in reduced labor, herbicide use, fuel use, noise and soil disturbance from heavy machinery. Goats can safely consume enormous amounts of biomass and at the same time sterilize weed seed in their digestive process rendering the seeds infertile. Goats have been used successfully by many of our neighboring municipalities and locally by Overlake Golf & Country Club for vegetation management. Please come out and visit the goats but remember to leash your dogs. Be respectful to the working goats by not touching or feeding them.

Summer is finally here and we live in a great time to be a dog owner. More and more, we are seeing businesses and other establishments becoming pet friendly. This is good news for those of us who love our furry friends and enjoy having them with us. However, there is a langer from the dog poop that many of us leave behind. It is estimated hat over 40% of American dog owners do not pick up the poop after heir dogs. There are over 89 million dogs in the US, so that means hat over 35 million dogs are not picked up after. It's not the dog's ault, it is the dog owner's responsibility.

Dog poop is the #3 cause of water pollution. In fact, it is so dangerous that the EPA has classified dog poop in the same category as chemical and oil spills. 90% of fecal bacteria comes from canines. 1 gram of dog feces contains 23 million fecal bacteria. When a dog poops and the owner does not pick it up, it can cause many problems to humans, the environment, and other dogs. When many dog owners choose to not pick it up, the dog poop seeps into the soil and after it rains can end up in our waterways. When the poop oxidizes, it releases ammonia. The waste contains bacteria such as E-Coli, Salmonella, as well as hookworm, ringworm, etc. Our waste water facilities do not have the capabilities to solve the dog poop problem.
